

New Waltham Parish Council

What has been happening and what is going to happen?

We have had so much going on it is hard to know where to begin but I suppose I have got to begin somewhere so here goes.

Our new CCTV system which was funded by the Police and Crime Commissioner is now live with cameras at Greenlands shops and New Waltham Community Pavilion, access to the recordings is strictly controlled under the Data Protection Act and is only available to Humberside Police, North East Lincolnshire Council and New Waltham Parish Council all of whom can also access via a static IP address and view each camera in real time. We have already had a request for an additional camera in a village hotspot and this is being considered by the parish council. We do hope this initiative will go some way towards deterring anti-social behaviour and crime.

PCSO Steve Sutton & PC Helen Dunks held their first surgery at New Waltham Community Pavilion with a view to engaging with our community, unfortunately only five people attended but never mind they will do it again and from tiny acorns

Priors Green is looking remarkably well and our contractor Ben from Creative Nature has done some fantastic hedge laying, created a bark chipping footpath and planted hundreds of saplings. Unfortunately we have suffered some uprooting of the saplings, however the culprits have been identified and will be working with Creative Nature to do the replanting. Please do take some time to visit Priors Green it really is a pleasant area. At the end of 2015 following many requests from residents for decorative village signs we ran a competition to design a new sign which was supported by residents and the children at New Waltham Academy and Enfield Academy. Our judging took place earlier in the spring and the judges had a difficult task due to the high standard of entry but in these things we can only have one winner and they chose 9 year old Benje Smith from Enfield Academy. We are now in the process of selecting a contractor and obtaining planning permission and then we will all be able to witness Benje's work for many years to come.

This summer the National Citizen Service will again be working with the parish council and the plan is for them to redecorate the pavilion in an attempt to brighten up a dull building.

On Sunday 7th August we will again have our Picnic at the Pavilion with the Cleethorpes Kingsway Printers Band, this will again be a free event as it has kindly been sponsored by BJB Lift Trucks.

Sunday 4th September is an open day at New Waltham Community Pavilion when we will be have a fun sort of day for residents to come a view the pavilion and to tell us what you would like to see do with it in the future, it is after all your pavilion and we want you to use it and make it a nice place.

Remembrance Day

Remembrance Day was known as Armistice Day, which marks the day World War One ended, at 11.00 am on the 11th day of the 11th month, back in 1918. It was named Remembrance Day after World War Two. A two minute silence is held at 11.00 am to remember the people who have died in wars. The anniversary is used to remember all the people who have died in wars, not just World War One, but also World War Two, the Falklands War and the conflicts in Afghanistan and Iraq.

The first two minute silence in Britain was held on 11th November 1919, when King George V asked the public to observe a silence at 11.00 am. This was one year after the end of World War One. There is now a Remembrance Sunday every year which always falls on the second Sunday in November and there are usually ceremonies at war memorials, cenotaphs and churches throughout the country.

A poem called 'For the Fallen' is often read aloud during the ceremonies, the most famous stanza of which reads:

They shall grow not old, as we that are
left grow old,
Age shall not weary the, nor the years
condemn,
At the going down of the sun and in
the morning,
We will remember them.

Fourth stanza of 'For the fallen' by Laurence Binyon (1869-1943)

Remembrance Day is also known as Poppy Day because it is traditional to wear an artificial poppy.

Nuisance Calls

These have become an unwelcome part of modern life and most people are sick of them.

Research has shown that out of 7 million calls in a 3 year period the average number of unwanted calls per month was 26 in England and 37 in Scotland which means that 4 out of 10 calls came from Telemarketers.

Of these 7 million calls 29% were geographical, 68% business, 71% number withheld, 92% number unavailable and 87% international calls.

A fair number of calls refer to PPI you may have paid, or to take part in a telephone survey which can be very long. Should you respond to these callers it is a guarantee that your details will be sold on to other firms resulting in even more calls. The elderly are also often targeted into signing up to services and products that they do not need, very often these older people are contacted a number of times to try and bully them into purchasing products and they can get up to 60 unwanted calls a month.

What can I do about it?

Register your details with The Telephone Preference Service (TPS) tel 0345 070 0707, tpsonline.org.uk. This will reduce the number of unwanted calls from UK mainland/BT lines etc. (although some rogue firms don't take heed of this).

Many cold calls come from abroad so unless you need to receive international calls, ask your phone provider to block calls from international numbers (although you may be charged for this).

BEWARE numbers starting with 09, 0871, 0873 and most 118 numbers are all premium rate numbers and cost much more to call than regular ones. Mobile text short codes (5 or 6 digits long) beginning, with 5, 6, 7 or 8 will cost even more. These numbers are often used to enter competitions.

Waltham Bowls Club

Waltham Bowls Club have relocated to the New Waltham Community Pavilion Bowling Green which is now their home base.

Previously they were based at the Sussex Recreation Ground in Cleethorpes and played in the Grimsby, Cleethorpes and District bowls league, as they do now.

The club were not at all happy suffering with the vandalism taking place at the Sussex Recreation ground especially when the hedge surrounding the greens was set alight by the vandals.

They now play weekly at the pavilion in New Waltham throughout the bowling season which starts in May of each year and finishes in September.

However, I consider my greatest achievement to be that, as I leave, the school will not miss a heartbeat, but continue to grow and develop further, thanks to the fabulous staff that I leave behind to take over the running of the school.

Finally, a big thank you from myself for the support of all the staff, parents and their children, both those here now and in the past - especially those children I spoke to all those years ago who first fuelled the desire in me to be the headteacher of New Waltham Primary.

Village Day Round Up

I can scarcely believe it's been a year since the last village day, but here I am writing up 2016's event! This year, the weather played a crucial role in the day's proceedings. The church's lawn housed the large gazebos, all decorated in the British flag. Near the entrance, the Queen and Prince Phillip (designed and made by the Guides) graced us with their presence and never even complained about the rain. Maybe,

like myself, they were amazed by the remarkably upbeat atmosphere; despite the increasingly heavy rain! The usual roars of excitement and encouragement, groans of disappointment and cheers of joy echoed around the village green as the pigs happily raced; pleasing little kids and 'big kids' alike. I was relieved to know all animal welfare rules were adhered to. Each pig lovingly had their batteries removed and was placed safely in their box at the end of the day!!

It was lovely to see both schools and OAK nursery having a stall each. Enfield Academy's home-grown omelette kits were so successful they had sold out in an hour or so! A testament to the talents of the budding young entrepreneurs of our community. Cookery Corner

Chocolate Fudge Cake

250g dark chocolate, chopped
125 butter
2/3 cup castor sugar
2/3 cup self-raising flour
4 eggs, lightly beaten

Grease a 19cm x 29cm lamington pan, line base with paper, grease paper.

Melt chocolate and butter over hot water, cool. Combine all ingredients in medium bowl, beat on low spread with electric mixer until ingredients are combined. Increase speed to medium, beat for about 3 minutes or until mixture is changed in colour and smooth.

Pour mixture into prepared pan, bake in moderate oven for about 30 minutes. Stand 5 minutes before turning on to a wire rack to cool. Serve dusted with sifted icing sugar.

Keeping time: 3 days.

EU Referendum

The historic European Union Referendum held in the United Kingdom on June 23rd produced a remarkable result and outcome, even more so locally.

North East Lincolnshire returned the highest percentage 'Leave' vote in the Yorkshire and Humber region.

On a 67.94% turnout (79,013 verified ballots), 69.870% of the electorate voted to Leave the EU, compared to a national Leave vote of 51.892%.

NELC Result - Leave 55,185, Remain 23,797.
Humberston and New Waltham Result – Leave 4522, Remain 1949.

Armed Forces Day National Event

It is a pleasure to report on the tremendous and successful Armed Forces Day National Event that took place in Cleethorpes and Grimsby on June 24th, June 25th and June 26th.

On Saturday the Ward Councillors donned suits on a very warm day to be part of the official celebrations on the seafront, returning in more casual attire later in the day to take part in the street party and witness the spectacular firework display. Eighteen months ago New Waltham was in danger of losing the open space known as Greenlands playing fields due to austerity measures within North East Lincolnshire Council, this may have resulted in the building being closed down, the bowling green left un-cut, the football pitches overgrown and the BMX track uninsured so New Waltham Parish Council decided to take over the management of this area of our village and today operates it as tenants.

The Parish Council in conjunction with the office of the Police and Crime Commissioner has also installed CCTV to provide extra security and to try and deter any anti-social behaviour

New Waltham Allotment News

Thank you for all the donations of water butts and composters plus several items of garden tools.

It is ironic that since we put in place the scheme to collect rain water and become self sufficient on it, that the water butts have never run dry, in fact this year, most of the water butts are still full and overflowing when it rains.

Here is a thought, on our site we have 6 x 250 gallon containers, 140 water butts, holding 45 gallon each, after the winter and early spring rains we have over 7000 gallons of rain water stored. The sheds, green houses and neighbouring garages/sheds are all utilised to collect rain water. WHY do large Allotment sites use mains water?, just think about the huge amount of water that can be saved and the expense of producing it throughout, not only this area. But country wide if every Allotment site were self sufficient on rain water.

It has been a strange year on the Allotment with carrots and parsnips struggling, runner and dwarf bean seeds rotting in the ground, but it looks as if the fruit trees, brambles and red currants will crop well. There has been some "monster" slugs about.

There is no vacancies on the Allotments at the moment but as there is only 8 plots on the site, there is usually a long wait but Waltham have vacancies and maybe Humberston as both have very large sites. The New Waltham Parish Council continues to seek land for another Allotment site in New Waltham.

The NCS Volunteers will be spending a couple of weeks in New Waltham in August,

several jobs have been listed for them.

If anyone has any loppers, shears or secateurs to donate please ring the Clerk or 01472 813797. Also tins of paint needed.
